




What We Do

SCFD is the Scientific and Cultural Facilities District, a tax collected and distributed to nearly 300 cultural organizations in our seven-county Denver metro region including Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas and Jefferson counties. Just one penny on every \$10 in sales and use tax spent in the district creates vibrancy for all of us. It provides our kids with a unique perspective and understanding of the world. It inspires all of us to discover the radical and the beautiful and stretches our capacity to be transformed. In short, it adds color to our metro area. Our community would not be the vibrant, nationally ranked metropolis it is today, without the cultural funding and economic impact created

by SCFD. Residents understand this and have approved continuing the tax at each of three renewal elections. With more than \$83 million granted in 2022, our community is enriched by an amazing kaleidoscope of culture that is available and accessible to everyone.

Beginning with taxpayers and with the expert shepherding of the SCFD, our collective mission is simple: We fund culture.



Message from the Board Chair and Director

In 2022, SCFD was proud to provide more than \$83 million in grants to nearly 300 organizations across the seven-county metro area, the largest amount in our 35-year history. This vibrant array of organizations provided many hues of arts, culture and science programming to roughly 14 million residents across the district, adding bright color to the Denver metro region.

Like the shifting patterns of a kaleidoscope, we saw the world of arts, culture and science grow and change in 2022. Many of our funded organizations began the slow recovery process from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and returned to "normal," in-person programming. Once again, audiences filled galleries, theaters, concert halls and other cultural venues. Unique performances, exhibits, and events brought wonder to communities throughout the district. And organizations worked independently and collectively on impactful experiences to create a vivid cultural scene for the people of the Denver metro area.

All of this is possible due to the residents of Adams, Arapahoe, Broomfield, Boulder, Denver, Douglas and Jefferson counties, who created and continue to support the SCFD. Our residents' desire to uplift arts, culture and science in our communities has allowed us to grow into the only seven-county funding model in the nation. Together, we can support organizations big and small in their missions to beautify, create, educate, perform and amplify what it means to be human. With just one penny on each \$10 spent in the district, we can enjoy the colorful kaleidoscope of culture for *all* in the Denver metro area.


THE BIG PICTURE



Prismatic Arts, Culture and Science Programs

Our funded organizations act as the prisms of color and light that create a reflective arts, culture and science scene for the Denver metro region. In 2022, organizations across the seven-county district provided a rainbow of important cultural experiences for our residents that were *collaborative*, *immersive* and *visionary*.







Collaborative

In February, the Colorado Conservatory of Dance's Studio Company partnered with the **Denver Young** Artists Orchestra and YouthSeen on a free, public performance of My Secret Bully, Anti-Bullying: Holistic Wellness Program. Adapted from the children's book My Secret Bully by Trudy Ludwig, the production featured live music composed by Florence Price, the first African American woman to have her work performed by a major orchestra. The full series of performances throughout Adams, Broomfield, Boulder and Jefferson counties empowered youth to go beyond being bystanders in bullying situations and build empathy, kindness and confidence. More than 3,400 students watched live performances and more than 2,700 students watched recordings of the performance virtually due to continued COVID-19 restrictions. Each collaborative performance was complete with wellness referral contacts and pre- and post-performance discussions hosted by YouthSeen.



Collaborative

Since 2014, **Denver Botanic Gardens Chatfield Farms** has partnered with **Veterans to Farmers** to provide a market farming program for military veterans to introduce them to farming careers. The program allows participants to develop job skills, learn how to operate a small farm, engage with other service and community members, practice self-care and mindfulness and receive financial compensation for their work at Chatfield Farms. In 2022, nine participants were responsible for maintaining a 3,000 square foot garden and helping the farm crew on a six-acre CSA farm, gaining skills in crop planning, harvesting and food safety. In addition, participants took farm tours along the Front Range to learn about different business models and approaches to farming. As a result of this collaborative project, the 2022 participants have gone on to work for local farmers, restaurants and start their own businesses.




Collaborative

In collaboration with the Alzheimer's Association, the Lone Tree Arts Center offers SPARK! Alliance, a free program for people experiencing mild memory loss, early-stage Alzheimer's, or related dementia. Utilizing the visionary framework from the Alzheimer's Association, the Lone Tree Arts Center began offering events in 2016 designed to stimulate memory through artistic experiences. In 2022, the Center's SPARK! Alliance program offered 10 unique events for over 340 participants and caregivers. Participants enjoyed musical performances by local musicians, visual arts explorations and interactive workshops about topics such as gardening and travel. Each event concluded with time for caregivers and participants to mingle, creating valuable socialization opportunities for those experiencing memory loss or other dementia.



Immersive

In 2022, Boulder Museum of Contemporary Art and **Anythink Libraries** partnered to provide exhibits for libraries from Brighton to Bennett dedicated to exploring the diverse landscapes of Adams County. The Anythink Fall Artist Showcase featured digital and analog artwork from local artists Eileen Roscina and Cherish Marquez, created alongside contributions from community members at four different libraries. Anythink Bennett featured Cherish Marguez, who led two community workshops where participants built a simple video game. Participants created their own virtual landscape, while telling personal stories of the town of Bennett which were embedded in the final game design. A topographic map was crafted from recycled fabric and conductive material, which allowed users to move through the community-created video games, all developed during the outreach workshops. These exhibits allowed community members and featured artists to immerse themselves in both contemporary art and the landscapes around them.



Immersive

Control Group Productions brought their audiences along for an immersive bus journey into climate catastrophe with their production of THE END. The production combined climate science, Denver history, Mountain West hydrology, science fiction and social engagement in local communities. More than 700 community members embarked on the 16-mile bus ride through Denver area water and green spaces, experiencing what it might be like to be displaced by climate disaster through the storytelling of Control Group Productions. Dramatic scenes throughout the ride imbued a sense of urgency around climate crisis and brought audience members into the story by activating all five senses. Each performance was followed by a discussion with a community environmental activist.



Immersive

The **Denver Gay Men's Chorus** partnered with **Cleo Parker** Robinson Dance and Rangeview High School's Concert **Choir** for the first time to present *Motown and More: From* The Temptations to Lizzo, a production centered around the greatest songs of the Motown era and selections from other great African American composers and artists over the last half century. Originally planned for March of 2020, the immersive show was revitalized in March of 2022. In addition to arrangements of hits by artists like Beyoncé and Aretha Franklin, the show featured the world premiere of three works choreographed by Ms. Parker Robinson and the Colorado premiere of The Seven Last Words of the Unarmed, by Joel Thompson. The piece was inspired by the last words of seven unarmed black men who died as a result of excessive tactics of police and authorities. The chorus was joined by the Rangeview High School Concert Choir in this powerful performance. More than 2,000 patrons attended the three shows at the Ellie Caulkins Opera House, and collaborations with both Cleo Parker Robinson Dance and Rangeview High School will continue as a result of the production.



Visionary

Mirror Image Arts' Restorative Theatre program works with youth ages 13-21 affected by the school to prison pipeline. Programming supports youth at three points: before, during and after incarceration. During incarceration, participants can take part in a 16-week course called It Starts With Us. The program culminates in youth facilitating the audience through theatre activities and reflection. In 2022, 122 youth participated in the program, and Mirror Image Arts was able to return in person for the first time since the pandemic to the Mount View Youth Services Center to work with incarcerated youth. Programming at Mount View Youth Services Center concluded with an improv show for youth and staff. In addition, the program continued its work with the Third Way Center and put on its first devised play in partnership with Rise Theatre. Mirror Image Arts also began participatory action research, allowing participants to collaborate with facilitators on how to define program success and skill evaluation to increase the impact of the Restorative Theatre program.



Visionary

In September of 2022, **Dairy Arts Center** and the **Creative Nations Art Collective** opened the Creative Nations Sacred Space, a space permanently dedicated to Native and Indigenous artists. The opening began with a traditional blessing, and the first exhibit, *Homelands*, featured works by artists from tribes with historical ties to Colorado including the Arapahoe, Cheyenne and Ute tribes. Robert Martinez and Bruce Cook, the exhibition curators, provided a live art demonstration for attendees. In addition to exhibitions, the Sacred Space hosted the Indigenous Arts Market and Festival, which featured traditional native dance and music, a native fashion show, and access to native art and food for 1,200 visitors. Going forward, the Sacred Space will also serve as a setting for rehearsals, readings and workshops. Since its opening, the Space has welcomed more than 30,000 visitors.



Visionary

Downtown Aurora Visual Arts (DAVA) offers many programs for youth, one of them being the free Job Training in the Arts & Technology program. The program uses long-term, process-driven projects to teach middle school students art and workforce skills. Students can create artwork and digital media that address everything from personal identity to climate change. In addition, all students earn a small stipend for their work in the program. In 2022, more than 500 students worked with guest artists on projects about outer space and botany and learned about filmmaking alongside the Colorado Film School. Notably, a group of 12 students and DAVA staff collaborated with the Charles Burrell Visual & Performing Arts Campus to create a logo for their new school. The final logo reflected the school's namesake, Charles Burrell, and the school's commitment to student engagement and decision-making. The 2022 program cohort also earned three Gold Key awards from the Colorado Scholastic Art and Writing Awards, contributed projects to the Denver Botanic Gardens' Día de los Muertos celebration and topped record sales at DAVA's Holiday Art Show & Sale.


